THEFT

Unfortunately we are again receiving reports that fruit and vegetables are being stolen on the allotments. As a committee we take this very seriously but are limited in what we can actually do about it.

The allotment rules state that all thefts must be reported to the police and an incident number obtained. We will always take this action and search for witnesses and CCTV images.

You may wish to consider installing CCTV on your plot. If you do be mindful that the camera must cover only your plot and not any others. If you see something suspicious then please report to the plot owner and to the committee. If you see fruit on trees then ask the plot owner for permission to have some - even fallers - rather than just taking. Don't assume that you can just help yourself.

POTATOES

Storing Potatoes

Having harvested your potatoes sort the best ones for storing. They need to be perfect, no holes from insects or wounds from the fork when harvesting. Those that have small holes or damage will not store as well so they go into your 'use first' bag.

Sorting Potatoes for Storing



Get your potatoes out of the ground as soon as you can (especially Earlies) to free up space. Leaving them in the ground once developed has no benefits and increases the risk of slug or other damage. (I'm guilty of this "I must try to do this in future")

Once your potatoes are dug up lay them out on the soil for an hour or so to dry. Try to get them reasonably clean. The best thing for storing potatoes is a hessian sack (burlap bag). These will release moisture and the hessian sacking material allows them to breathe whilst excluding light. Available from the hut.

If you don't have a hessian sack available then you can try paper sacks.



Never store potatoes in plastic bags and especially not in transparent or white ones. Not only will light get through but moisture will not escape and your potatoes will rot quite quickly.

Storing Potatoes Cont

Green Potatoes

Light will, over time, cause your potatoes to turn green which are poisonous.

Check Your Stored Potatoes

It's a good idea to empty out the sack after a month and check that none of the potatoes are rotting in storage.

Correct Temperature for Storing Potatoes

The sacks themselves should be stored in a cool, dark place. The ideal temperature for storing potatoes is between 5° and 10°C. Too warm will reduce storage life but too cold can be worse.


Freezing Potatoes

If you have damaged potatoes that you know will not keep you can make things like duchess potatoes, croquet potatoes or chips and freeze them.

PEARL OF A POTATO

In the past I have not had much success in growing 1st early potatoes, and had actually stopped attempting to grow them.

Then, last September, when the order form from the shop showed a new variety, Caledonian Pearl a replacement for International Kidney was available, I thought I would try again.

What had I to lose other than the £3 cost and the time given to plant them! So I duly added them to my usual order of Cara and Desiree.

I am so pleased I did. What a success!

The potatoes were indeed early. Healthy plants produced lovely yellow, basically egg shaped and sized potatoes with a slightly waxy texture and with a good flavour.

It was the quantity that each plant produced that was equally impressive. So much so I took a photo of what came from 1 plant.

Caledonian Pearl will certainly be on my order form this year.

Potatoes in Straw

Potatoes Grown in Straw – is it good? A couple of years ago Gary had a go at growing potatoes in straw. It was a case of "why not give it a go"? A wooden crate was lined with weed membrane to hold the straw.

I then put in about 2 inches of rotted manure and placed 4-6 inches of straw on top. ...cont.





I then put 6 potatoes evenly spaced around the crate and placed more straw on top. I added water and waited for the green shoots to show.



I topped up with more straw as the potatoes grew (like mounding the earth up) on 3 occasions. Watering is now important as the air and wind can leech moisture out. Water frequently...

Harvesting

The harvested potatoes came out fairly clean and the digging out was lighter than soil. The yield was at least on par with soil grown potatoes. The remaining straw can be laid on the ground to help nourish crops next year.

Definitely be growing potatoes in straw again - Just got to build some more crates!

Extract from the magazine article..

When to Start No Dig "My favourite time to start No Dig is November to March. It is quicker and easier, and one has more time to do it. Then you are free to plant in early spring.

You can make a new bed on weeds, or surface mulch previously dug soil – even in freezing weather.

In dry weather its worth watering soil first, and water any cardboard you use well."

This No Dig article is highly recommended and a good starting place.

It's the Bonfire season but..

PLEASE AVOID SMOKY BONFIRES. Our neighbours enjoy their back gardens and when they're prevented due to smoke from bonfires they complain to the Council Environmental Officer who take the matter very seriously. This will result in bonfires being banned totally and termination of your tenancy (Section 23 NBC Allotments).



Make sure any wood, green matter or contents of compost bins are dry. Fork them over to let air dry them.

As the fine weather summer months seem to be longer in recent years the committee are considering changing the period when bonfires can be held from September - March to October 31st to February 28th.

Recipe for Green Tomato Chutney

- 2lb green tomatoes chopped
- 8ozs onion
- 8ozs cooking apples peeled and cored
- 8ozs sugar (we use white as we like our chutney green)
- 1 tsp pickling spice
- ¹/₂ pint vinegar
- ¹/₂ tsp salt

Prepare tomatoes and other vegetables and fruit, chopped, sliced or minced as you like; put in a pan with the other ingredients (use a muslin bag for whole spices). Simmer gently till vegetables are soft and mixture thickens.

Bottle into clean sterilised jars.

SPEEDING



Speeding on the site continues to be a problem. Some plot holders think this rule doesn't apply to them.

The site road has loose stones and speeding damages the roads creating ruts and pot holes.

Please remember that the roads are maintained by volunteers (usually committee members). This involves wheeling barrows of stones to fill in pot holes as a result of speeding. Not much fun and very time consuming.

If you'd like to help you'd be very welcome! No Takers? Well keep to the speed limit!
